Mastering remains a somewhat misunderstood topic. For all the press on the recording process, there are only a few books available that discuss the mastering process. The final creative step in the record making chain, mastering determines how the CD or DVD will sound. It is the first step in the manufacturing chain, creating the production master from which all the replicated discs are made.

Bob will discuss many aspects of mastering with emphasis on the fact that mastering is not just making an original recording louder. There are many creative decisions that have to be made. He will focus on recent titles he has worked on and cover what was involved in their mastering.

Demystifying Line Arrays

Line Arrays have become all the rage in live sound and theatre applications, and as such are constantly requested by those who want the best and latest sound reinforcement. But are they always the best choice? Many misconceptions are taken as fact. Andrew Hope of Gerr Audio spoke about Line Array Theory from its beginnings, the Evolution of Line Arrays, Line Array Myths, Predicting Line Array Behavior, and Optimizing Line Array Performance. Harry F. Olson, PhD defined the line array in 1957 in his book "Acoustical Engineering", published by D Van Nostrand Co., Princeton New Jersey. A line array was defined by Olsen as a group of omni-directional drivers which achieve directivity due to their combined constructive and destructive phase relationships....
