Early Studio History

The Electronic Music Studio of the University of Toronto (UTEMS) was founded in 1959 by Dr. Arnold Walter, the then Dean of the Faculty of Music. Its first director, Myron Schaeffer (1908-1965), developed the Hamograph, an amplitude control device and produced numerous compositions (Dance 4:3 (1960), Haiku nos. 1-3 (1962), Lament from Jephtha (1963), film music (New Intruder (1962); The Smile (1962)), as well as collaboration with Harvey Olnick and Arnold Walter on music for television (Summer *Idyll* (1960)). During the 1960's the studio attracted many composers from Canada, the United States, and overseas. Those having worked in this period include Robert Aitken, Norma Beecroft, Douglas Lilburn (New Zealand, Four Studies (1963)), Jean Ivey (USA, Enter Three Witches (1964)), Anthony Gnazzo (USA, Music for Two Pianos and Electronic Sounds (1964); numerous works for dance), Pauline Oliveros (USA, numerous works, (1966), Albert Mayr (Italy), Rudolf Komourous (Gone (1969)), and Richard Henninger (Reflections from Outer Space (1969)). While at UTEMS, Lowell Cross (USA), a doctoral student and research assistant, developed systems for controlling light and video images using electronic sound (Video II (1965)); collaborated with Gustav Ciamaga (*Phone Phugue* (1966) television), Harry Freedman (*Isabel* (1967) film); and Harry Somers (electronic sequences for the opera Louis Riel (1967); produced electronic compositions (Three Etudes for Hugh LeCaine (1965)) and compiled a bibliography of electronic music (A *Bibliography of Electronic Music* (1967) U of T Press)

In addition to being a traditional analog studio, UTEMS has also been involved in the use of computers. Gustav Ciamaga, the studio's director since 1965, collaborated with James Gabura from 1963 to 1968 in the development of a computer-controlled analog synthesizer *Piper II*. During 1971-72. UTEMS also implemented a "MUSIC IV" type program called OUTPERFORM. This was adapted by David Jaeger and was used not only for original sound synthesis, but also for teaching computer techniques. In 1977, William Buxton developed a graphics-oriented digital synthesizer in cooperation with the Faculty of Music (Structured Sound Synthesis Project (SSSP)). Composers working in the studio in the 1970s include members of the Canadian Electronic Ensemble (David Jaeger, Jim Montgomery, Larry Lake, and David Grimes), Bruce Pennycook and Dennis Patrick.
